Aims

The objective of the course is to produce design proposals were the analytical tools of archaeology allow supporting architectural options of design, and viceversa, were the architectural intentions and sense construction is incorporated in the various forms or archaeological intervention – from preventive archaeology to archeological reconstruction.

Themes

Each edition has its own themes, based on interventions in archaeological sites reated with territorial and landscape problems. In the first editions, a set of four *Fora* located in villas of the south of Portugal were chosen: Miróbriga, Beja, Mértola and Idanha-a-Velha. These *Fora* do have an important impact in the urban landscape of respective cities.

For the bext three editions, design studio will include design studies in archaelogical sites located in the south and southwest coast, allowing to develop preventive protection actions; a set of four Villas of the 3rd and 4th century located along the Guadiana river, allowing to develop protective design strategies of archaeological sites located in rural areas; and two territorial areas located in the north of the country, articulated by landscape infrastructures.

Methods

The design studio exercises are developed through a reflexive practice, group work and tutored individual work. sepcific courses will allow to improve drawing and communication skills, through various forms of representation (analogue as well as digital) including model construction. Theoretical reflexion includes site visits reports, case studies, and a design process cosntruction.

Assessment

There are two planned sessions of design studio critics - one interim, and a final session - involving invited architects an archaeologists.

Aims

This course gives a a set of very precise tools of territorial analysis, contributing to the study of geo-historic subjects; these tools allow develop student's skills in the analysis of landscape lines of strenght, communication axes, hidrographic elements, parcelling plots and habitat.

Themes

The themes of land parcelling, *limitatio* and roman centuriation, routes and infrastructure design, the erosion processes of siltation in the shoreline, context interpretation.

Methods

The course is organized articulating theoretical classes with pratical exercising classes. These last classes will introduce reading methods on graphic representation in archaeology, cartographic interpretation, archaeological techniques of reading aerial photography, viewsheds and aviewspots.

Assessment

Aims

Landscape Archaeology: Architecture and Territory is a theoretical course that deepens common visions of architecture and archeology, through an anthropological or anthropo-archaeological spatial approach.

Themes

Taking the experience on the archaeology of bronze and copper settlings, purposes readings that evoque primoridal perceptions on the organization of the natural space. The historiography of interpretative paths, referes to Landscape Archaeology in Archaeological Parks; the construction of the archaeological territorial park, through the arcaheological site; contexts, interpretation and preservation of archaeological territorial areas is another theme, as well as the professional approacht to landscape archaeology.

The interpretations of architecture and landscape in antiquity, as well as in nineteenth and twentieh century are also subject of study.

Methods

The fenomenological approach of the course allows to question both disciplines taking the landscape and the territory as privileged locus of that articulation. Magistral classes on relevant theoretical themes are articulated with courses on case studies, based on lecturers experience as landscape architects, archaelogists or architects.

Assessment

Group essay related with topics of the course.

Aims

Regarding Portuguese experience in the field of heritage interventions, and the international cases to be presented in the cycle of conferences of this subject, the student should develop a critical perspective on different Narratives of Restoration, such as the relations that are established between the landscapes and built archaeological environment, as well as the desired musealization of space.

Themes

The themes are articulated with the general themes of each edition of the master; for the first edition, the themes are very mriuch articulated around interventions in *Fora*; for the next issues, the themes will as well follow the general topic of each edition.

Methods

The aim of this course is to debate a set of highly relevant examples of intervention in archaeologic sites, by proeminent authors. These examples allow the debate about the objectifs and results, and disciplinary and extradisciplinary processes involving the interventions. The lectures bring the debate about highly qualified projects in both disciplines - architecture and archaeology, and broaden the cultural landscape of students.

Assessment

A final individual essay.
